

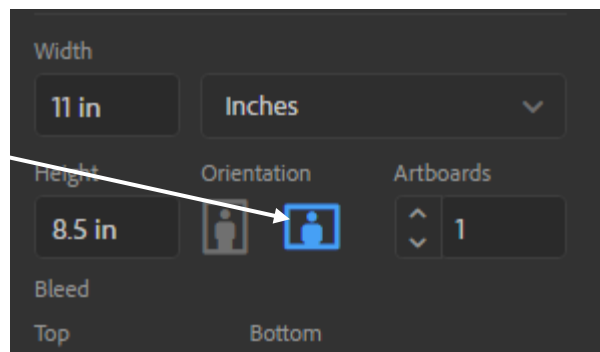

Lesson 3 – Bacon Burger

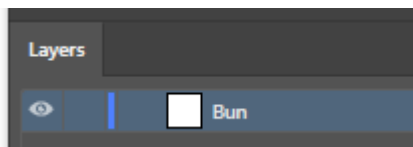
Skills: Page Orientation, Layers, Stroke, Effects, Scissor Tool

1. File>New. Width = 11, Height = 8.5 and Unit = inches. Click the Landscape button under Orientation. Click Create

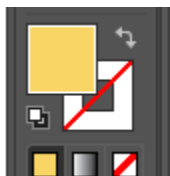
2. Your artboard will look like this:



3. Go to Window>Layers. Double-click Layer 1 and rename it Bun.



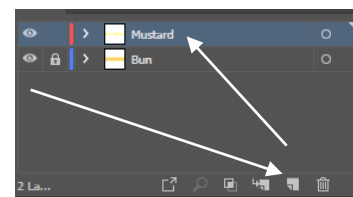
4. Select the Rounded Rectangle tool. Go to Window>Swatch Library>Foods>Vegetables and set the Fill color to a good color for a bun. Set the Stroke color to None. Draw a rounded rectangle as shown.



5. Click the lock box on the Bun layer to lock the layer so you can't accidentally make changes to it.



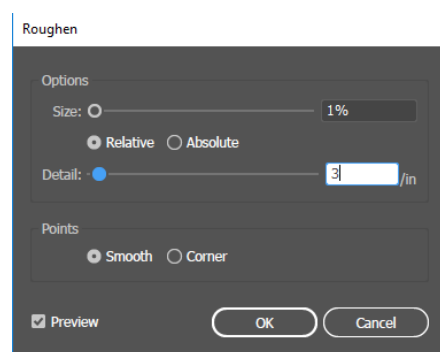
6. On the Layers palette, click the New Layer button. Double-click the new layer and rename it Mustard:



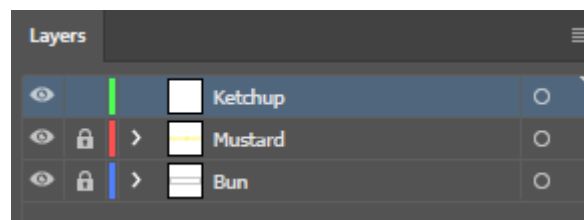
7. Click the Rectangle tool. Change the Fill color to a bright yellow and the Stroke to None. Make sure the Mustard layer is selected. Draw a very thin rectangle as shown:



8. Select the mustard rectangle and go to Effect>Distort & Transform>Roughen. Use these settings: Size = 1%, Relative, Detail = 3, Points = Smooth



9. Lock the Mustard layer. Create a New Layer and rename it Ketchup:



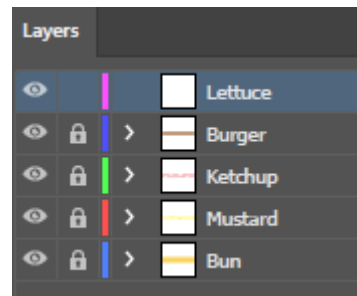
10. Repeat steps 7 and 8 only this time make the rectangle red. Use your down arrow key to move the ketchup onto the mustard. You should get something like this:



11. Lock the Ketchup layer. Create a New Layer and rename it Burger. Select your Rounded Rectangle tool. Set your Fill color to a brown color and Stroke color to None. Draw a burger shape as shown:



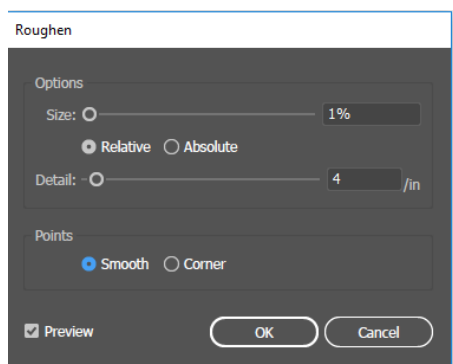
12. Lock the Burger layer. Create a New Layer and rename it Lettuce. Set your fill color to a green color and Stroke color to None.



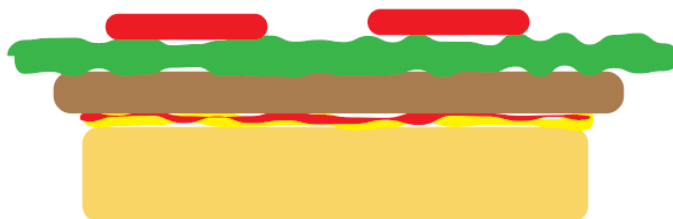
13. Draw a Rounded Rectangle as shown:



14. Click the green rounded rectangle. Go to Select the green rounded rectangle and go to Effect>Distort & Transform>Roughen. Use these settings: Size = 1%, Relative, Detail = 4, Points = Smooth



15. Lock the Lettuce layer. Create a New Layer called Tomatoes. Set the Fill color to red and the Stroke color to None. Draw two tomato slices as shown:

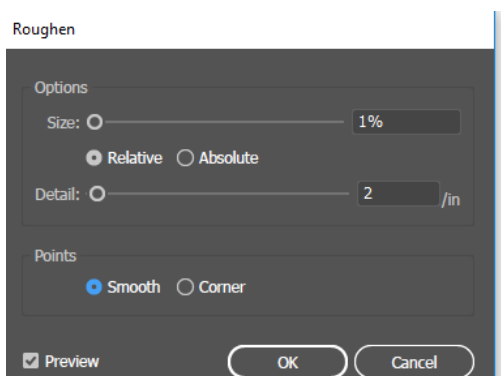


16. Lock the Tomatoes layer. Create a New Layer called Bacon. Go to Window>Swatch Libraries>Foods>Vegetables. Set the Fill color to a dark red and the Stroke color to None.

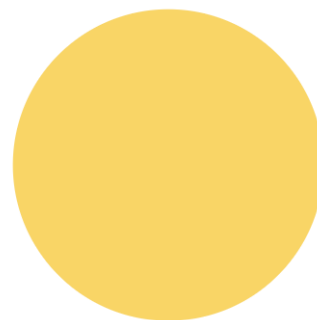
17. Select the Rounded Rectangle tool. Draw a shape for the bacon as shown:



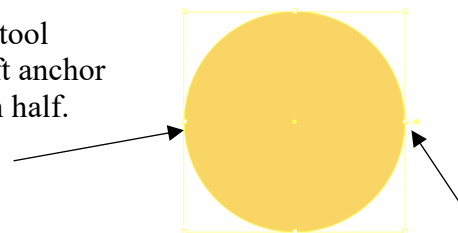
18. Go to Select the dark red rounded rectangle and go to Effect>Distort & Transform>Roughen. Use these settings:  
Size = 1%, Relative, Detail = 2, Points = Smooth



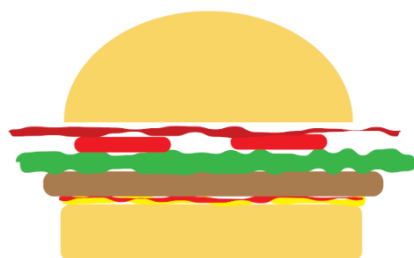
19. Lock the Bacon layer. Create a New Layer and rename it Top Bun. Select the Ellipse tool (Hold down Rectangle Tool). Go to Window>Swatch Library>Foods>Vegetables and select the same Fill color you used earlier for the bottom bun. Set the Stroke color to None. Hold the SHIFT key and draw a circle. (SHIFT makes a perfect circle)



20. Select the circle with the Black Arrow tool. Select the Scissor tool (Hold down the Eraser tool). Click the Scissor tool once on the left anchor point and once on the right anchor point. This will cut the circle in half. Click your Black Arrow tool to see the cut parts.



21. Delete the bottom part of the circle. Select the sides of the top part with the Black Arrow tool and stretch it wide. Place the top bun as shown.



22. Select the Ellipse tool. Change the Fill color to a light orange color. Draw a small oval shape:



23. Select the orange oval with the Black Arrow tool. Hold the ALT key and drag a copy of the oval shape off to the side. Repeat so until you have 5 copies of the oval shape.



24. Use the Black Arrow tool to place the oval shapes onto the top of the bun and you are done!
